Reflecting on their participation in the program, the students shared the following remarks:

- Akofa Bruce (President of the HBCU-ACC): "The experience I gained as a member of the HBCU-ACC will forever be an integral steppingstone in my professional career. When I joined this initiative, I did not anticipate how much growth it would bring out of me as I learned from my advisor and worked with my peers. I approached this endeavor as I would any other, with my strong ambition for education and a willingness to learn. My determination was noticed, and I was selected to serve as the President of the 2023-2024 cohort. This presidency required diligence, time management and open communication and I delivered to the best of my ability alongside my fellow officers. Serving as President and being a correspondent meant maintaining my responsibilities when it came to leadership, as well as being proactive to ensure I advanced my skills throughout the program. Competencies such as fairness and adaptability in journalism have become more than familiar to me as I interacted with different articles, reporters, and story ideas. I have improved my professional writing by studying AP style. I also gained proficiency in analytic journalism which supported my international reporting and commentary. Along with conducting support work for the global public relations course, I managed our correspondence with multiple journalists and experts that imparted their wisdom to our cohort. My newfound skills in news gathering, interpreting data, conducting interviews, and utilizing beat notes helped me better understand the fundamentals of storytelling and contributed to my forthcoming reporting project on the Kenyan protests in DC happening in response to the proposed 2024 finance bill. Being awarded Correspondent of the Year and having the chance to hone my writing, photography, speaking and decision-making skills has made me more eager to explore what I can do with more guidance and resources."
- Aurelia Mouton (Vice President of the HBCU-ACC): "The HBCU-ACC program has provided me with the confidence and competence to identify relevant opportunities, use my growing professional network in a meaningful way, and present myself and my work with finesse. Throughout the program we were challenged to confront any insecurity and uncertainty about our work and to, instead, improve on those areas we felt needed bettering. As the Vice-President, I had the additional opportunity of promoting and advising the South African students. This was an honor for me, and I am sure I will make use of this leadership experience going forward. The practical skills we gained and the contacts within the industry that we made are incredibly valuable. They will serve each student well in future endeavors and job applications. I cannot think of a better career launch for young journalists, commentators, and communications professionals."

The second is the combined skill of presentation and connecting. The way you present a pitch for an article is the first step to success. From this follows connections. As a journalist, your power is not only a pen but the audience and resources you bring to your publication. Connections are as important as breathing in the current media landscape."
- Tatiana Allen: "My time spent in the HBCU-ACC was one full of appreciation for every challenge that I faced and the guidance that I received from Michael Walsh. I already had a passion for the field, being a journalism major, but this program opened up doors that a classroom alone couldn't offer me. There were moments that I didn't know where to go, how to start, or how I could leverage myself as a journalist, and relying on the community of my classmates who had more experience made this program rewarding in the end. This program allowed me to do research and conduct interviews on a topic and in a country that I wasn't an expert on five months ago. Now I can boldly say that being in the country, speaking with others, and getting to know the history showed me how important my topic was. It has made me open-minded to governmental issues outside of the U.S. and given me an appreciation for those doing the unspoken work that often doesn't get a thank you.

I am walking away with an expanded network of contacts, valuable knowledge, an updated resume, and a community of young professionals like myself."

• Michael Walsh (HBCU-ACC Advisor): "This year's cohort of the HBCU-ACC was special. We had our largest group of guest speakers in history. We also had multiple correspondents receive media coverage of their accomplishments. None of this would have been possible without the leadership of Akofa Bruce, Aurelia Mouton, and Mfundo Msimango. As officers, they served with distinction to the credit of their respective universities. It is with mixed emotions that this year's program has reached its end. It is clear that some of our student journalists are on the verge of major career breakthroughs, and I can't wait to see them making headlines in the near future. Just today, I was working with one of our correspondents who is finalizing freelance articles for two of the biggest news outlets in South Africa. As the student journalists will attest, the HBCU-ACC is not an easy program to complete. It not only requires a lot of coursework. It also forces student journalists out of their comfort zone. This is not an academic program, it is professional development. We are preparing our correspondents to succeed in the workforce. Given the current state of journalism, that can be challenging. It means that the students need to be more competitive than ever before."
